Leota Gaines has crafted more than 5,000 stuffed animals since 2008, after her husband passed away. Each handmade creation - cats, elephants, turtles, bears, dogs and ducks in a variety of colorful prints - takes her nearly three hours to complete and no two stuffed animals are alike.

Leota, who donates and drops-off these plush playpals to Driscoll Children's Hospital, the Ronald McDonald House, the Purple Door (formerly the Women's Shelter of South Texas), and the Flour Bluff Volunteer Fire Department, has added the Children's Advocacy Center of the Coastal Bend to her growing list.

At age 6, Leota's paternal grandmother taught her how to sew. Leota was too short to reach the pedals, so her grandmother tied cigar boxes to her feet with bale wire as an easy fix.

Leota, a former foster parent who turned 86 last month, says she loves children and that sewing the stuffed animals brings her great joy.

"I cannot just sit here and do nothing," she said.
"If there's anything I can do to help a child, I'll do
it, because children are our future."
